
ARBORFTUM

Rather than a departure, Arboretum is an arrival, a synthesis of two seemingly disconnected directions. The project brings together my better-known inclination toward the altered ordinary object with the obsessive, usually text-based, rubber stamp drawings I have quietly produced throughout my career. Several years ago I completed Tree of Trees using a vintage rubber stamp holder and some old wooden rubber stamps retired from a bank. Ever a sucker for wordplay, I wanted to exploit the linguistic fact that stands like this, due to their verticality and layering, are often called "trees." So I replaced the once functional stamps with a collection of homemade leaf stamps – a set of 26 species including elms, maples, chestnuts, etc. - resulting in a hybrid tree of trees.

The idea was to use it as an engine for creating naturebased drawings, but what those drawings might look like escaped me as I worked on more pressing matters. Last fall I finally found some quality time to experiment, and eventually discovered that I could successfully recreate full trees solely from the use of one small handheld tool. But, of course, the mighty oak consists of many humble leaves. This realization provided something I continually long for in my studio practice: a completely self-generated context for intense and highly-focused labor wherein both spontaneity and a freeing mindlessness are reached. If a thing of beauty, whatever that may mean, is the end result, all the better. Nevertheless, deep in the welcomed meditation, as the sumac or the sassafras slowly reveals itself, I am a force of nature, I am an artist.
